## Head Coach Mike Gillian

Longwood University named Mike Gillian as the seventh head coach in the history of men's basketball at the institution on May 2, 2003. Coach Gillian, in his fourth year during 2006-07, is charged with building an NCAA Division I program, and has been doing so from the ground up during his first three seasons while compiling a record of 16-72. The program finished 10-20 during 2005-06 while tying for the seventh-best turnaround season in Division I (plus 9.5), year three of the school's four-year Division I Reclassification.

Longwood begins this season with 11 scholarship players (same as last year) and all five returning starters among 10 letterwinners, including the top six scorers overall who combined for 79 percent (1,740 of 2,194 points) of the team's offense a year ago. The Lancers finished 1-30 during 2004-05, their first year playing a full Division I schedule while competing with just nine scholarship players and no seniors. Longwood was 5-22 during 2003-04, the first year of the DI transition while competing with only seven scholarship players and just four returning letterwinners – a team depleted even further at mid-season with the loss of the squad's leading scorer.

"There was a very specific vision for Longwood University articulated to me by Dr. Patricia Cormier three years ago when she offered me the opportunity to be Longwood's first Division I men's basketball coach," said Gillian. "It is a very exciting time to be directing the Longwood Basketball Program. Over the last three years we have made significant strides forward, have begun to experience some success at the Division I level, and are in position to continue along that same path. The internal competition within our program is continually getting

tougher. The external competition is now familiar to all of our players. These two main factors are what lead us to believe we are ready to put the Longwood Basketball stamp on the world of college basketball."

Prior to his arrival at Longwood, Coach Gillian had been an assistant coach at George Mason University under head coach Jim Larranaga from 1997-2003. He had also worked under Larranaga for one season at Bowling Green State University (Ohio) (1996-97) before going to George Mason with Larranaga. Gillian played a role in the recruitment of several members of the Mason team that shocked the world of college basketball last spring while advancing to the Final Four in Indianapolis.

During Gillian's six seasons as an assistant coach at Mason, the Patriots went 100-74 overall with a 66-34 Colonial Athletic Association (CAA) record, winning two CAA Tournament championships (1999, 2001) and two CAA regular season titles (1999, 2000). He counts George Evans, currently playing overseas, among the many standout players he helped coach at GMU. George Mason also earned two NCAA Tournament appearances (1999, 2001) and made one National Invitation Tournament (NIT) appearance (2002). The Patriots were 57-18 overall at home in the Patriot Center, posting a 41-8 CAA homecourt record.

At Bowling Green, the Falcons finished 22-10 while winning the 1997 Mid-American Conference regular season title (13-5) and earning an NIT appearance. MAC Player of the Year Antonio Daniels, currently

a member of the NBA's Washington Wizards, led that BGSU team.

Prior to joining Larranaga at BGSU, Gillian was an assistant coach at Division II American International (Mass.) from 1989-95. During that six-year stint working for current Indiana Pacers advance scout Jim Powell, the Yellow Jackets went 117-58 overall with a 75-33 Northeast-10 Conference (NE-10) record, winning both the NE-10 regular season and tournament championships in 1994 (26-6). American International also advanced to the second-round of the Division II Tournament that year.

Gillian has been a member of the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) since 1989. He was a YES Clinic speaker at the Division I Men's Final Four from 1998-2000, and has extensive public speaking experience through his involvement with numerous boost-

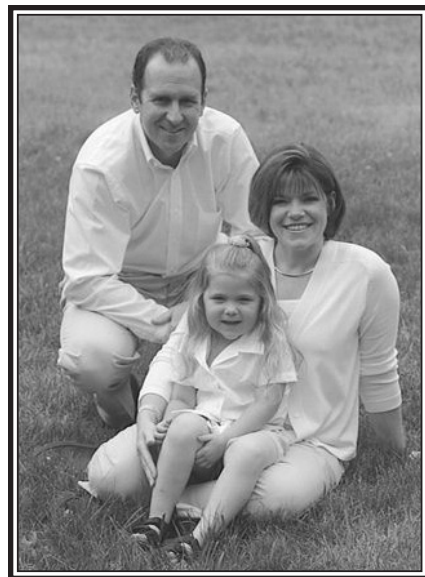

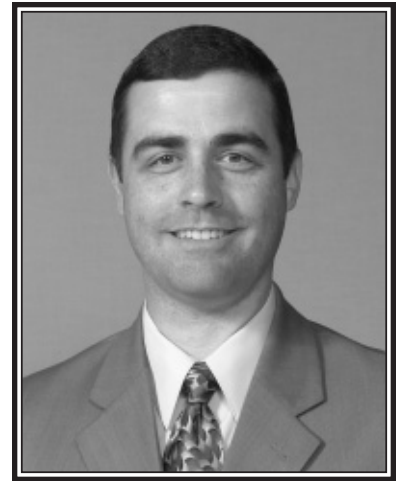
Bill Reinson is in his fifth year as an assistant coach for men's basketball at Longwood University during 2006-07. He joined the program prior to the 2002-03 campaign after having spent the previous two seasons (2000-02) as an assistant coach at UNC Greensboro.

At Longwood, Reinson is involved with the most important aspects of the men's basketball program. These include on and off campus recruiting, opponent scouting and game plan preparation, player skill development, as well as assisting head coach Mike Gillian with practice preparation and scheduling of opponents. Reinson served as the interim head coach for two games (1-1) late in the 2002-03 season, his first at the school, due to an illness of the head coach.

During Reinson's two seasons as an assistant coach at UNCG under head coach Fran McCaffery, the Spartans went 39-23 overall, winning the 2001 Southern Conference Tournament Championship. UNC Greensboro earned one NCAA Tournament appearance (2001) and made one National Invitation Tournament (NIT) appearance (2002).

Prior to his time with the Lancers and Spartans, Reinson was an assistant coach at NAIA King College in Bristol, Tennessee during the 1988-89 season. He has also coached at Seton Catholic High School (freshman boys basketball) in Chandler, Arizona and at Mesa High School (assistant football) in Mesa, Arizona.

A native of Mesa, Arizona, Reinson



earned his bachelor of science degree in business administration from the University of Phoenix. He and his wife, Lana, have three daughters: Megan (21), a student at Virginia Tech, Bria (16), and Taylor (12). The Reinson's recently added two new members to the family in Niko (8) and Spiros (6).

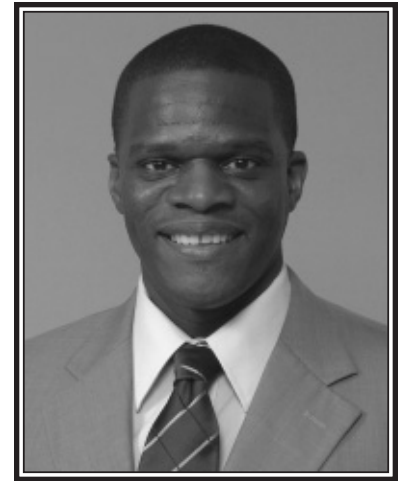

Michael Huger is in his second season as an assistant coach for men's basketball at Longwood University during 2006-07. Huger had previously played professionally in Europe for the past 12 years after graduating from Bowling Green State University.

At Longwood, Huger's responsibilities include on and off campus recruiting, coordination of team travel, opponent scouting and game plan preparation, player skill development, and assisting with practice preparation.

Huger played in Belgium from 1996-2005, including time with Basket Club Liege (2001-05), FLV Athlon Ieper (2000-01), and Racing Antwerp (1996-2000). He began his professional career in Finland for Turku (1993-94) before playing in Holland for two years (Goba Gorinchem, 1994-95; Rotterdam, 1995-96).

Huger was the Dutch League's MVP for 1995-96, averaging 25.3 points and 5.8 assists. He has also earned first-team All-Belgium honors in both 2000 (15.7 points, 5.3 assists) and 2004 (13.6 points, 4.0 assists), leading both of those respective teams to



Belgium Cup Championships.

Additionally, Huger has coached and mentored the Liege Basket Club Junior League program since 2001.

A native of New York City, Huger led Stevenson High School in the Bronx to consecutive PSAL City Championships in 1988 and 1989. He earned his bachelor of science degree in education from Bowling Green State in 1994.

Huger was a standout for the Falcons from 1989-93, twice earning Mid-American Conference honors (1993, 1992) while also a Naismith Award nominee in 1993 (16.0 points, 4.1 assists). That year (1993), he was also runner-up for conference player of the year honors to Ohio's Gary Trent. Huger totaled 988 career points and 283 career assists at BGSU.

Huger is married to the former Tonya Wimberly.

## Season Outlook

At Virginia. Home against VCU in Willett Hall. At Oklahoma. At Providence. At George Washington. At Richmond. These games highlight the 2006-07 campaign under the direction of fourth-year head coach Mike Gillian. Longwood will be competing in the final year of the school's four-year NCAA Division I Reclassification. Coach Gillian's program remains a countable Division I opponent for everyone, with inclusion in the all-important Ratings Percentage Index (RPI) as well.

Longwood returns all five starters among 10 returning lettermen from a year ago when the program finished 10-20 while tying for the seventh-best turnaround season in Division I (plus 9.5, from 1-30), including the top six scorers overall who combined for 79 percent (1,740 of 2,194 points) of the team's offense. Additionally, seven players return who played at least 18 minutes per game, averaging 26.6 minutes among them overall. Each of the seven averaged at least 7.0 points per game, including three double-figure scorers.

"We have prepared for the 2006-07 season exactly the way we did a year ago," stated Gillian. "We will to go out and play a fantastic schedule that takes us around the country to play in some of the game's most historic, and exciting venues. We will, once again, play a lot of games against teams that surely will go on to play, and have success, in the NCAA Tournament. We have also been able to get some very good programs to come here to Willett Hall and play against us. This maintenance of the level of external competition has us prepared for what lies ahead.

"In preparing for this year, our returning players have done a great job getting ready for the season. They have worked very hard to enhance the skills they rely on daily and improve areas of their game that needed work. They have been diligent in their efforts to be better physically and mentally. Our new players this year certainly have the ability to make their presence felt on the court. They are all prepared to take the level of success we have achieved at Longwood a step forward. Longwood Basketball is on the rise."

### Returning Starters (5)

The returning starters include seniors Maurice Sumter (6-5, guard-forward) and Clayton Morgan (6-7, forward), along with juniors Lamar Barrett (6-6, forward), Brandon Giles (5-10, guard), and Dana Smith (6-5, guard-forward).

"There is now an interesting mix in our program of upperclassmen with tremendous experience and younger players who are in the process of learning what this level of basketball is all about," explained Gillian. "All of our juniors and seniors have worked extremely hard and sacrificed a great deal to get Longwood Basketball where it is today. That investment has paid dividends for them individually and for our team collectively.

Sumter has started all 87 games of his Lancer career, averaging a team-best 15.5 points last season while adding 5.4 rebounds. He led the team in scoring 12 times and posted 25 double-figure scoring games, including five 20-plus point games with a season-high of 28 points while recording 25 double-figure scoring games, including five 20-plus point games. Sumter earned Division I All-Independent 1st-Team honors; and was also selected to the College of Charleston Classic All-Tournament Team. Additionally, he surpassed 1,000 career points, ranking 13th all-time with 1,087 points.

"Maurice has developed into the efficient all-around player we envisioned him becoming when his career began," said Gillian. "His level of play over the last 19 or 20 games last year was very high and his leadership role in our program is unquestioned. It is a great feeling to go to the gym every day knowing there are players like Maurice there, ready to go.

"Clayton added another dimension to our team a year ago and we

are looking for more of the same out of him this year. He is a tremendous rebounder at both ends and is an excellent decision maker with the ball in his hands."

Morgan was a pleasant addition to last year's team from junior college and started 23 of 30 games, adding 12.3 points and a team-best 8.6 rebounds while leading the team in rebounding 18 times. He posted 21 double-figure scoring games, including four 20-plus point games with a career-high of 28 points. Morgan added seven double-figure rebounding games, including a team-best six double-doubles, with a career-high of 16 rebounds. He earned All-Independent honorable mention honors.

"In the junior class we have the group of Brandon Giles, Dana Smith, and Lamar Barrett," explained Gillian. "All three of these young men have progressed to the point of being fixtures in the starting lineup. Their maturity as players and willingness to 'put the team first' is a major reason we have the expectations we do going into this season."

Barrett was the only player to start all 30 games a year ago, averaging 7.0 points and 4.0 rebounds. He scored a season-high 18 points and had seven double-figure scoring games while leading the team in rebounding two times.

Giles started 19 games, including the final 15 consecutive and averaged 4.4 points and a team-best 3.3 assists. He scored a career-high 21 points, including a career-high five three-point field goals (5-5) while leading the team in assists 11 times.

Smith started 15 games, including the final 13-straight while averaging 9.6 points and 4.7 rebounds. He, too, scored a career-high 21 points and had a career-high 10 rebounds on three occasions along with 14 double-figure scoring games. Smith led the team in scoring three times, and in rebounding seven times.

"Players like Maurice, Clayton, Brandon, Dana, and Lamar make each other better and are the epitome of the coaching axiom, 'good teams have good players, great teams have great teammates,'" stated Gillian. "At Longwood, we are striving for greatness."

### Top Returning Lettermen (3)

The other top returning lettermen are seniors Michael Jefferson (6-3, guard) and Husein Pistoljevic (6-2, guard) as well as sophomore Kirk Williams (6-6, forward).

"Maurice Sumter, Mike Jefferson, and Husein Pistoljevic are beginning their fourth year at Longwood together, and Clayton Morgan is beginning his senior season as well," added Gillian. "All four of these guys have experienced special moments in a Longwood uniform and are an integral part of the success we have started to enjoy."

Jefferson, a starter in all 73 games of his Lancer career, had led the program in scoring for two seasons before ankle injuries limited him the first half of last season, one unceremoniously cut short after a season-ending groin injury last January that caused him to miss the final 15 games of the year. Prior to his injuries, he averaged 12.8 points, 2.3 rebounds, and 2.3 assists with a season-high of 26 points. Jefferson posted nine double-figure scoring games, including three 20-point games, and led the team in scoring eight times. He was also named to the John Thompson Foundation Classic All-Tournament Team.

Pistoljevic ranks third in career three-point field goals (154), and averaged 3.3 points last year with a season-high 10 points.

Williams electrified the crowds a year ago with his high-octane play that produced several spectacular slam dunks. He averaged 7.6 points and 4.1 rebounds while shooting a team-best 56.9% (87-153) from the field, posting a career-high 17 points on two occasions along with a career-high nine rebounds. Williams had 10 double-figure scoring games and led the team in scoring two times and in rebounding three times.

## Season Outlook

"We are also looking forward to having quality depth in our program this year," said Gillian. "Kirk Williams and Husein Pistoljevic have both proven to be consistent contributors and we'll be expecting more of the same out of both of them."

### Other Lettermen (2)

A pair of senior walk-on team members return in Darren Holmes (6-6, forward) and Joel Rowe (6-1, guard). Holmes played in 12 games, averaging 1.6 points and 1.1 rebounds with a season-high seven points and a career-high four rebounds. Rowe started one of 16 games played and averaged 0.8 points and 0.5 assists with a season-high three points on two occasions.

### Newcomers (4)

Those new to the program this year include junior transfer Danny Wilson (6-8, center) along with true freshmen Billy Robinson Jr. (6-7, forward), Kevin Swecker (6-2, guard), and E.J. Dawson (6-1, guard). Wilson started at NJCAA Division I Louisburg (N.C.) Junior College where he averaged 12.2 points and 9.1 rebounds last season. Robinson Jr. starred at Hammond (Md.) High School, averaging averaged 12.1 points, 10.2 rebounds, and 3.0 blocks as a senior. Swecker averaged 10.5 points as a senior at Mount Saint Joseph, a team that finished 38-1 and was ranked among the Top Ten in the final USA TODAY national high school rankings. A third-team All-Baltimore Catholic League selection, he helped Mount Saint Joseph establish a new Maryland high school record for wins (38). Dawson, a walk-on team member as well, averaged 16.1 points as a senior at Mount Vernon High School in northern Virginia where he was the National District player of the year.

"Danny Wilson, Kevin Swecker, and Billy Robinson are our three newcomers this year," added Gillian. "All three of these guys will help us improve our internal competition and be pushing the returners for playing time."

### 2006-07 Schedule

This year's schedule will no doubt prove very challenging, as have the schedules of the past two seasons. In addition to the individual schools already mentioned, Longwood will participate in the exempt four-game Findlay Toyota Las Vegas Classic December 17-23 as the Lancers compete in this prestigious event for the second time in three years. Longwood will play its first two games of the tournament on the road at New Mexico on December 17 at 9 p.m., and at Southern California December 19 at 10:30 p.m. before playing two games in Las Vegas at the Orleans Arena against Charleston Southern on December 22 at 3 p.m. and either Kennesaw State or Maryland-Eastern Shore on December 23 at either 3 p.m. or 5:30 p.m..

Longwood will play at Virginia for the second consecutive season on February 13 at 7 p.m. in the new John Paul Jones Arena. The Lancers will host VCU in Willett Hall on November 13 at 7 p.m., a contest that is expected to draw a capacity crowd to the on-campus facility. Longwood travels to Oklahoma of the Big 12 Conference on January 30 at 8 p.m., the second-straight year of road competition against a Big 12 member after opening last season at Nebraska. The Lancers will also play road games at Big East school Providence on January 2 at 7:30 p.m., followed by a pair of away games at Atlantic 10 Conference members George Washington on November 17 at 7:30 p.m. and at Richmond on November 20 at 7 p.m..

The remainder of this year's schedule will include home games against Virginia-Wise (Nov. 11, 2 p.m.), Shenandoah (Nov. 25, 3 p.m.), Navy (Dec. 1, 7 p.m.), American (Dec. 30, 3 p.m.), Savannah State (Jan. 20, 2 p.m.), Hampton (Jan. 22, 7 p.m.), High Point (Jan. 28, 7 p.m.),

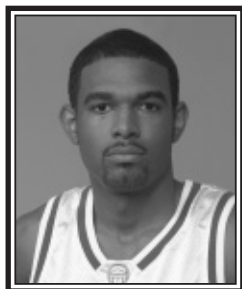

### Raising The Bar

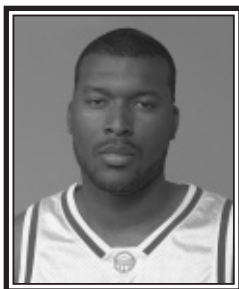

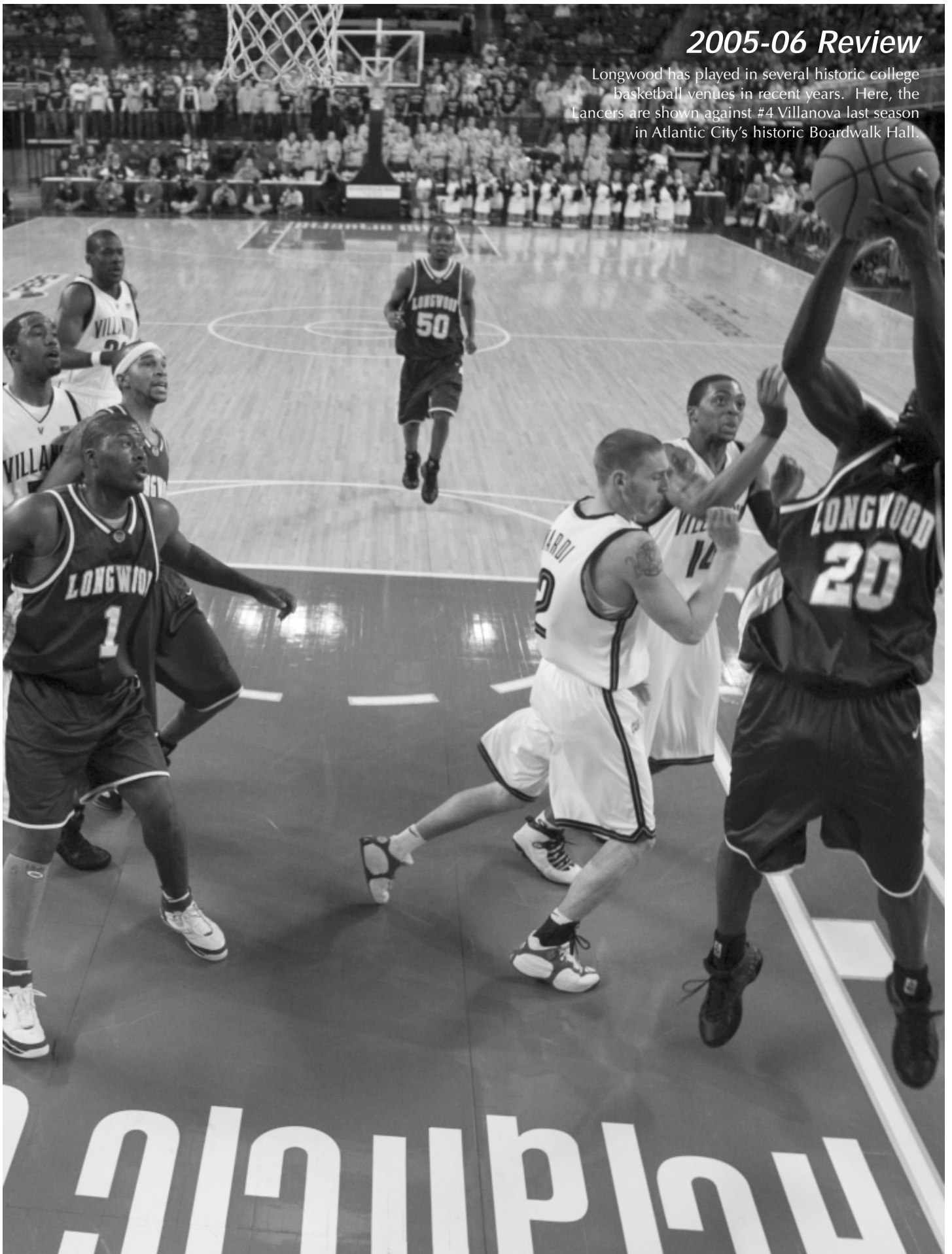

## 2005-06 Review

## Season Recap

Longwood completed the 2005-06 campaign with a final record of 10-20, an impressive differential of plus-9.5 after the previous year's 1-30 record. It was a turnaround year among the top 10 (tied for seventh) in NCAA Division I men's basketball last season. Head Coach Mike Gillian's Lancers were strong down the stretch with seven wins over the final 11 games, including six wins in the last seven home games in Willett Hall where the program was 8-4 overall a year ago. Overall, Longwood lost eight games by 10 points or less, including one in overtime, while three of the losses were by three points or less.

"Going into last year we told our team that the external competition for them would be nothing new," explained Gillian. "Our returning players had played at places like Illinois and Wake Forest, and played against other high profile opponents like Cincinnati, Old Dominion, and Northern Iowa.

"What we needed was for our internal competition to get better and tougher. By that we meant our returning players had to improve and our incoming players had to be capable of making an immediate, positive impact on the program. Collectively our skill level had to be better. We had to be tougher physically, mentally, and emotionally.

"The combination of all of these factors led to some success for us during the 2005-06 season. We ended the year as the seventh most improved team in Division I college basketball."

Highlights to the effort included a well-played 90-77 loss to #4 Villanova contested in Atlantic City, New Jersey at prestigious Boardwalk Hall, a 77-73 late-season home win past James Madison in Willett Hall, an early-season 88-75 home win past Liberty, along with a pair of three-game winning streaks. Also, a 69-66 road win at Hampton that halted a 38-game road losing streak must be mentioned -- it was the final road game on the schedule. Finally, the 10 wins were also more than the previous two seasons combined (6-52).

The highlight to the campaign came early in the season (December 10) when Longwood played the nationally-ranked Wildcats in Atlantic City. Playing the first game in Boardwalk Hall in nine years, Villanova of the BIG EAST Conference led 15-3 just 5:05 into the contest. The Lancers fought back, though, and were within four points, 29-25, at 5:32 before the Wildcats finally took control of the opening half with a 15-7 run to lead 44-32 at halftime. Longwood trailed 50-38 at 15:55 but Villanova once-again gained momentum and opened a 62-44 lead with 12:21 remaining as All-American Randy Foye tallied seven quick points, including 5-6 free throws -- four of them courtesy two technicals against the Lancers, one following a monstrous alley-oop dunk by freshman Kirk Williams (12:58) and the other against the bench (12:21). The Wildcats took their one and only 20-point lead at 5:27 (79-59) before head coach Jay Wright finally emptied his bench with 1:48 remaining. Junior Michael Jefferson led Longwood with 19 points, Foye scored 22 of his game-high 27 points in the second half, including 17 points during the first 7:40 of the final 20 minutes for Villanova.

Hosting JMU late in the season (February 18) following two-straight losses, Longwood took an exciting home victory in Willett Hall. It was the Lancers' first-ever win over Dukes while playing in front of a near-capacity crowd of 2,418, a game that got off to a tremendous start after University President, Dr. Patricia P. Cormier, presented the unveiling of the school's new athletic logo. Junior Maurice Sumter had the hot hand early, making five of his first six shots while scoring 11 points to help the Lancers to a 15-3 lead just 4:34 into the contest. LU led 30-25 with 6:08 left in the half on seven-straight points from Sumter, including a fastbreak dunk down the left-side of the lane. The visitors, however, forged ahead 39-38 at the intermission. In a hard-fought game that saw 12 lead changes and eight ties, Longwood took the lead for good at 69-67 on a three-pointer from junior Clayton Morgan with 3:01 remaining. The

Lancers outscored James Madison 11-6 over the final 3:01, including the huge three by Morgan before sophomore Brandon Giles secured the home win with 6-8 charity tosses over the final 1:39. Sumter scored 20 of his game-high 27 points in the first half, while Giles was 5-5 from the field, all three-pointers, and 6-8 at the line for a career-high 21 points.

At Hampton two nights later (February 20), Longwood never trailed after jumping ahead 17-7 at 13:49. The Lancers continued to lead by double figures in the first half, and took their largest lead of the game at 30-13 with 4:25 left until halftime as LU led 37-26 at the intermission after shooting 62% (13-21) from the field during the first 20 minutes. Longwood extended the lead to 44-30 early in the second half at 17:27, and still led by 10 points at 46-36 with 11:37 remaining. Hampton, though, battled back and tied the game at 55-55 (6:51) but the Lancers quickly responded with eight unanswered points and led 67-58 at 1:05 before the Pirates made it interesting by scoring eight of the game's final 10 points. Morgan finished with game-highs of 20 points and 10 rebounds, while Sumter added 19 points. Longwood and Hampton were playing for the first-time ever in men's basketball as the road win by the Lancers was their first true road win since Nov. 25, 2003, though LU has won two neutral-site games during this same period.

Individually, it was a break-out season for Sumter who started 29 games while leading the team in scoring (15.5), steals (1.9), blocks (1.0), and minutes (33.6) -- adding 5.4 rebounds and 2.7 assists. He posted a season-high of 28 points against IPFW (1/30) while recording 25 double-figure scoring games, including five 20-plus point games. Sumter earned Division I All-Independent 1st-Team honors and was also selected to the College of Charleston Classic All-Tournament Team. He surpassed 1,000 career points at Liberty (2/13), ranking 13th all-time with 1,087 points.

Throughout the season, Longwood visited eight different states while playing games in two historic venues: Boardwalk Hall in Atlantic City and storied Municipal Auditorium in Kansas City. The Lancers also played 10 games against nine fellow Virginia schools, winning five. Most importantly, Longwood established control on its homecourt with eight wins in 12 games while averaging nearly 1,000 (994) fans.

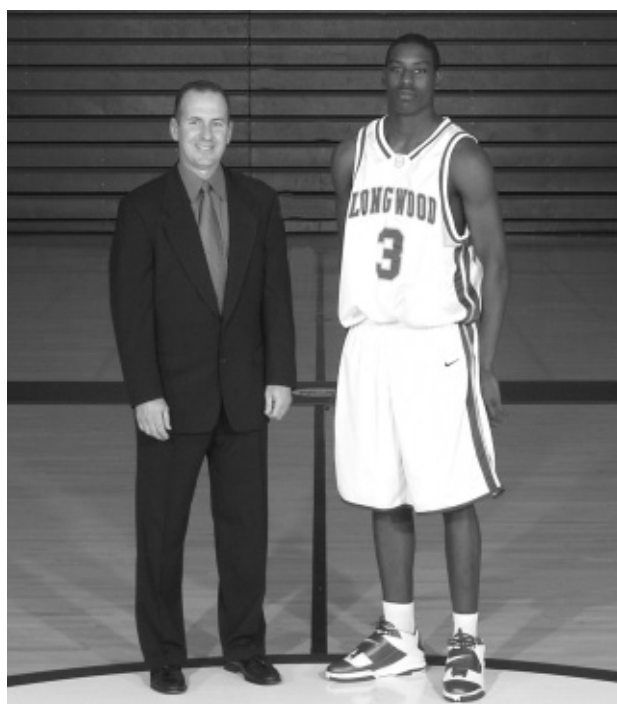

A 10-2 run by the Cavaliers increased the margin to 22-12 with 13:18 left in the first half. A pair of free throws from Smith made it 24-

16 at 11:39 before the hosts used another 10-2 run to lead 34-18 at 9:07. LU fought back to within 34-22 with 8:32 remaining in the period before hot-shooting UVA closed the half with a 24-12 run to take a commanding 58-34 lead at halftime.

The Cavaliers increased their advantage to 30 points at 66-36 just 3:45 into the second half and the Lancers were not closer than 26 points, on a couple of occasions, the rest of the way. UVA finally took its largest lead with the final margin of 35 points, outscoring LU 10-1 over the final 1:58 of the contest.

In a hard-fought game that saw 12 lead changes and eight ties, Longwood took the lead for good at 69-67 on a three-pointer from Clayton Morgan with 3:01 remaining. Brandon Giles secured the home triumph with 6-8 charity tosses over the final 1:39.

Playing in front of a near-capacity crowd of 2,418, Longwood got off to a tremendous start after University President, Dr. Patricia P. Cormier, presented the unveiling of the school's new athletic logo. Sumter had the hot hand early, making five of his first six shots while scoring 11 points to help the Lancers to a 15-3 lead just 4:34 into the contest. JMU, though, came right back and took its first lead at 25-23 (7:14) en route to leading 39-38 at the break.

James Madison took its largest lead at 47-43 early in the second half at 14:41 but Longwood came right

back with an 18-6 run to lead 61-53 at 7:59. Giles connected on two three-pointers during the run, while Lamar Barrett scored eight points during the stretch. 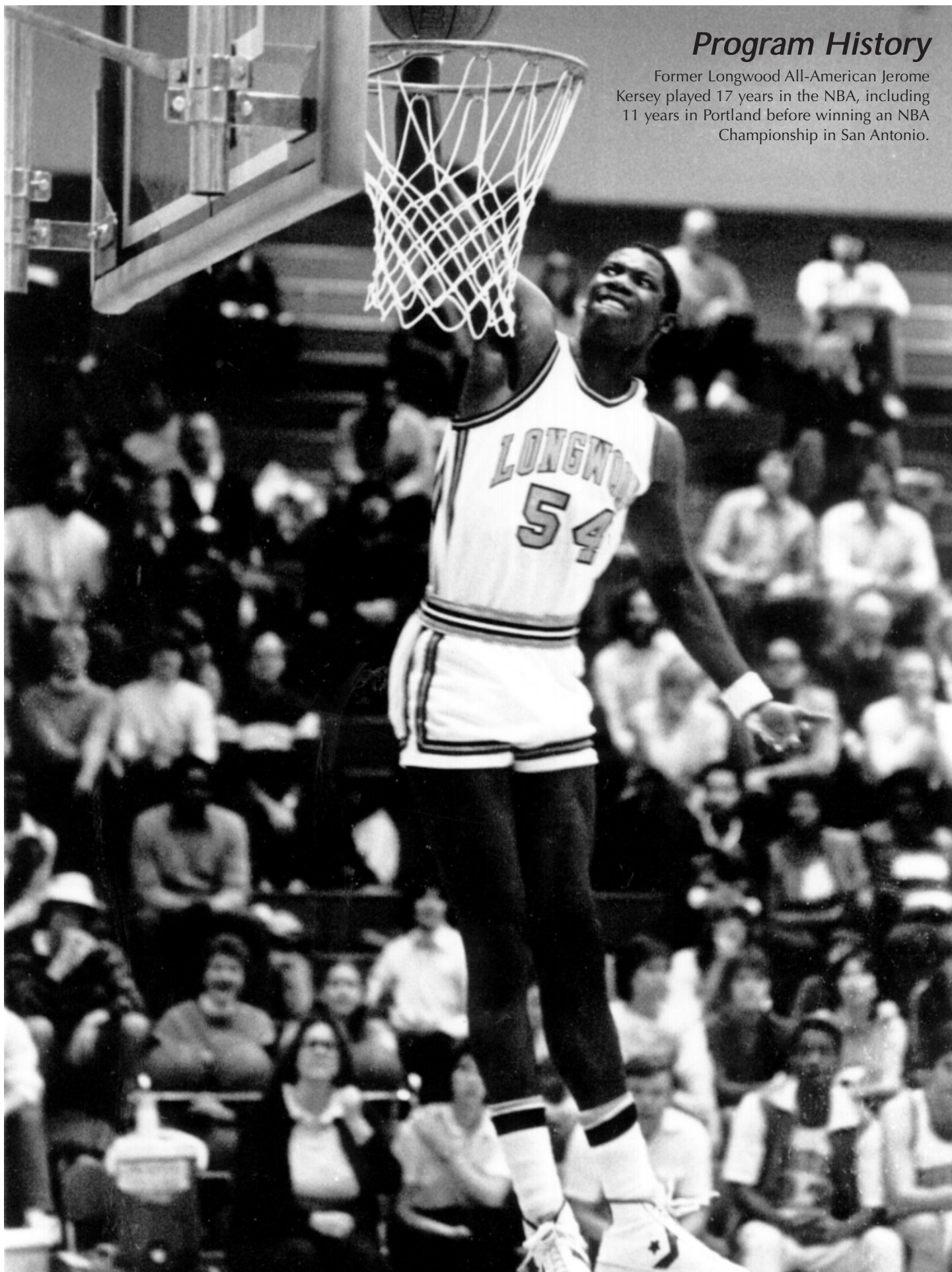

## Thirty Years

Longwood University embarks upon its 31st year of men's basketball competition during 2006-07. The Lancers finished 10-20 a year ago (2005-06), tying for the seventh-best turnaround season in NCAA Division I (+9.5). It was also their third season under the direction of head coach Mike Gillian during year three of the school's four-year *Division I Reclassification*. Coach Gillian's appointment as head coach in May, 2003, signified a **new foundation** for Longwood Basketball.

Coach Gillian has led the program into the Division I Era, playing against nationally-ranked teams Illinois (#1, 2004-05), Villanova (#4, 2005-06), Wake Forest (#6, 2004-05), and Cincinnati (#17, 2004-05) while competing against storied programs at Virginia (2005-06) and San Francisco (2004-05), as well as nationally prominent Kansas State (2005-06), Louisiana Tech (2005-06), Nebraska (2005-06), Northern Iowa (2004-05), and Valparaiso (2004-05, 2005-06). Additionally, the Lancers have played in-state schools VCU, Richmond, Old Dominion, James Madison, William and Mary, Liberty, Radford, VMI, and Hampton over the past three seasons. During this time, Longwood has traveled to 19 different states and Washington, D.C..

Men's basketball at Longwood University has become the University's most visible and popular intercollegiate athletic program since beginning competition with the 1976-77 season. Since that beginning, the Lancers have compiled an overall record of 400-383 for a winning percentage of .511%.

Longwood celebrated 25 years in style during 2000-01. That year, the Lancers enjoyed their fourth 20-win season, fourth NCAA Tournament appearance, and first-ever Division II CVAC Conference Tournament Championship. The season was one to remember as Longwood finished 23-8 while advancing into the Division II East Regional, defeating West Chester (Pa.) 103-95 in the first round before falling 77-76 in overtime to eventual Elite Eight participant Queens (N.C.) in the NCAA regional semifinals. Also that year, Colin Ducharme became the first Longwood men's basketball player to earn National Player of the Year honors from the NABC and was a consensus first-team All-America selection.

Longwood's four NCAA Tournament appearances include back-to-back participation following the 1993-94 and 1994-95 campaigns. In 1993-94, Longwood defeated Carson-Newman (Tenn.) 76-63 in the first-round of the Division II South Atlantic Regional before Norfolk State edged the Lancers 61-59 to halt a school-record 20-game winning streak. In an NCAA regional consolation game, the blue and white fell 88-87 to Elizabeth City State (N.C.). The following year, Longwood lost

to Shaw (N.C.) 83-76 in the first-round of the Division II regionals. These two seasons were the finest back-to-back years ever for the Lancers as they achieved a two-year record of 42-15, an outstanding winning percentage of .737%.

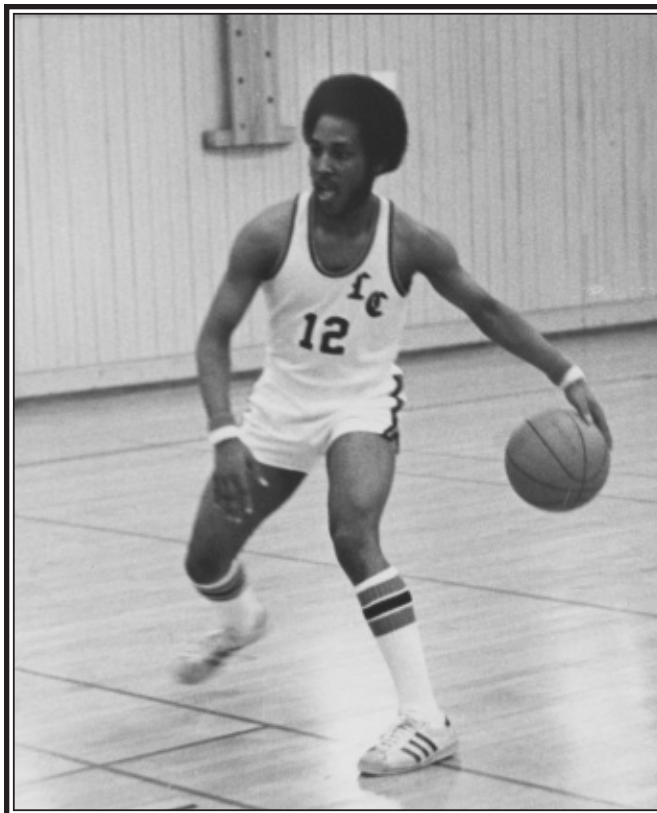
Longwood made its first appearance in an NCAA Tournament at the conclusion of the 1979-80 season, in just the fourth-year of the program's existence. The Lancers advanced all of the way to the NCAA Division III Final Four played in Rock Island, Illinois. That squad compiled a school-record of 28-3, with two of the losses taking place during the NCAA Final Four to North Park (Ill.) and Wittenberg (Ohio).

The following season, 1980-81, Longwood stepped up to NCAA Division II certification and has accumulated 12 winning seasons since, including three 20-win campaigns, and three other years at an even .500 record.

Over the years, the Longwood men's basketball program has produced a talented lineup of players. At the top of the list is former two-time All-American Jerome Kersey (1980-84), who still holds 10 school-records and enjoyed a solid 17-year NBA career after his Longwood playing days ended.

Colin Ducharme has obviously been the most outstanding Longwood player since 2000. Ducharme posted a double-double average of 19.6 points and a national Division II-best 15.8 rebounds during 2000-01, adding 4.2 blocks (2nd nationally) and 3.2 assists while shooting 60% from the field and 79% at the free throw line. He has since played professionally in Europe. Joining Ducharme in recent years as an outstanding player has been Jason Pryor (2000-02). Pryor ranks 10th in career points, scoring 1,148 career points (25.5) in just two seasons (45 games). He had seven games with 35 or more points during his brief tenure, including four of the top five single-game totals all-time. He too has since played professionally in Europe.

Other top Lancer players during the 2000's have included Marques Cunningham (2000-02), Claude Davis (2001-02), John Parker (2001-03), and Charles Stephens (2002-04). Cunningham scored 801 career points (15.1) in just two seasons (53 games), adding 223 assists (4.2). Davis averaged 14.1 points during his one season, including numerous highlight-reel dunks for the Lancers, and has since played professionally in the Continental Basketball Association (CBA). Parker averaged 11.5 points and 8.5 rebounds during his two seasons (41 games), once grabbing 19 rebounds in a game (12th-best all time). Stephens scored 907 career points (22.7) in only a season and a half (40 games), adding 393 rebounds (9.8). He posted two 36-point games, tied for 10th-best all time, also once grabbing 19 rebounds in a game (12th-

best all time).

A talented group of players during the 1990's included Lee Farior (1996-2000), Jason Outlaw (1994-98), Vince Walden (1994-98), DeVonne Johnson (1992-96), Joe Jones (1992-96), Benji Webb (1992-96), J.B. Neill (1991-95), Matt Watkins (1991-95), Charles Brown (1991-94), Adam Huffman (1991-94), Michael Druitt (1990-94), and Bryan Weaver (1989-93). Farior ranks sixth on the all-time scoring list with 1,300 career points. Outlaw scored 901 career points and ranks among the top 10 in rebounds (500), assists (248), steals (193), and blocks (48). Walden ranks fifth in three-point field goals (89). Johnson is the career leader in three-pointers (167). Jones is seventh on the all-time scoring list (1,254), and has since played professionally in the International Basketball Association (IBA) and overseas. Webb scored 962 career points, and ranks sixth in rebounds (550). Neill is second in three-point field goals (157). Watkins ranks sixth in steals (154). Brown ranks 12th in scoring (1,100) and sixth in assists (271). Huffman is eighth in blocks (47). Druitt is the career leader in games played (112) and ranks second in assists (400). Weaver scored 918 career points, and is fourth all-time in rebounds (595).

The decade of the 1980's produced such standouts as career scoring leader Kevin Jefferson (1986-90), Doug Poppe (1986-90), Dale Shavers (1986-90), Darryl Rutley (1986-89), Lonnie Lewis (1982-86), Ron Orr (1979-83), Joe Remar (1979-83), Kenny Ford (1978-81), and Shack Leonard (1978-80). Jefferson totaled 1,806 points during his outstanding career, including a phenomenal school-record 107 dunks over four years, and also grabbed 467 career rebounds. Poppe is 11th in scoring (1,139), and second in both rebounds (653) and blocks (91). Shavers ranks ninth in scoring (1,188). Rutley only played three seasons and is eighth in scoring (1,230), once scoring 37 points in a game, still equal to the seventh-best single-game total all-time. Lewis ranks fourth in scoring (1,452). Orr is fifth all-time in scoring with 1,335 career points, and third in rebounds (648). Remar is the all-time assist leader with 531, and also scored 1,479 career points to rank third all-time. Ford is 13th in scoring (1,040). Leonard was an All-Northeast Region selection in 1980, and was the Northeast Regional Tournament Most Valuable Player during the magical 1979-80 run to the NCAA Division III Final Four.

The original Longwood Basketball standout was the late Jimmy Yarbrough (1976-78), still the school record-holder for single-game points. A former associate director of admissions at the institution, he scored 46 points against Bluefield College during the 1977-78 season,

including a school-record 16 field goals. Yarbrough's 22.5 scoring average during the program's inaugural 1976-77 campaign still ranks fourth all-time.

Jimmy, one of Longwood's most beloved employees, died April 14, 2005 following an eight-year battle with non-Hodgkins lymphoma.

Standouts on this year's team, such as the senior class of Michael Jefferson, Maurice Sumter, Husein Pistoljevic, and Clayton Morgan; along with underclassmen Lamar Barrett, Brandon Giles, Dana Smith, and Kirk Williams will look to add their respective names among the elite Lancers in the history of Longwood Basketball.

## 1979-80 Division III Final Four

It was a magical season for a program in only its fourth year of existence. The 1979-80 Longwood College men's basketball team made believers out of everyone while compiling a school-record 28-3 campaign en route to the 1980 NCAA Division III Final Four Tournament. In only its second year as an NCAA member, the Lancers came within three points of winning a National Championship.

At the Final Four, played in Rock Island, Illinois, Longwood played two-time defending national champion North Park (Ill.) in a semifinal contest that nobody gave the Lancers a chance to win. The blue and white trailed just 30-28 at halftime before the Vikings went ahead 42-36 midway through the second half. LC battled back to tie the contest at 45-45, and led 53-52 with just 39-seconds left. A pair of controversial traveling calls against the Lancers allowed the Chicago school to take a 56-53 lead at :13. A Joe Remar layup made it 56-55 at :06 before North Park made one of two free throws at :05 to provide for the final score of 57-55. A potential game-tying layup by LC was blocked at the buzzer.

Playing Wittenberg (Ohio) in the consolation game, LC jumped to a 30-24 advantage at the intermission. The Tigers forged ahead in the second half before Thomas Alston connected on a baseline jumper to tie the game at 45-45 with 37-seconds remaining. Wittenberg got a basket at :09, but Remar forced overtime with a 22-footer just ahead of the buzzer. The extra period was scoreless until a questionable foul call against the Lancers put a Tiger at the free throw line with no time on the clock at the end of the OT. After missing the first attempt, the second free throw was good to secure the 48-47 decision.

The unbelievable year witnessed Longwood advancing further in the NCAA Division III Tournament than any previous Virginia school at the time. Ranked #12 in the final national poll, the Lancers had winning streaks of 16 and 12 games during the season, and entered the Final Four with the best record in the nation (28-1). LC advanced to the Final Four with post-season tournament wins past Framingham State (Mass.) 73-63, Clark (Mass.) 70-60, and Potsdam State (N.Y.) 78-61.

The two narrow losses at the Final Four concluded what former SID Hoke Currie described as an "unbelievable, indescribable, and yes, amazing season."

## 2000-01 Conference Champions

The remarkably amazing one-season turnaround of the 2000-01 Longwood men's basketball program concluded with the Lancers tough and disappointing 77-76 overtime loss to Queens (N.C.) in the NCAA Division II East Regional semifinals in Fort Mill, South Carolina.

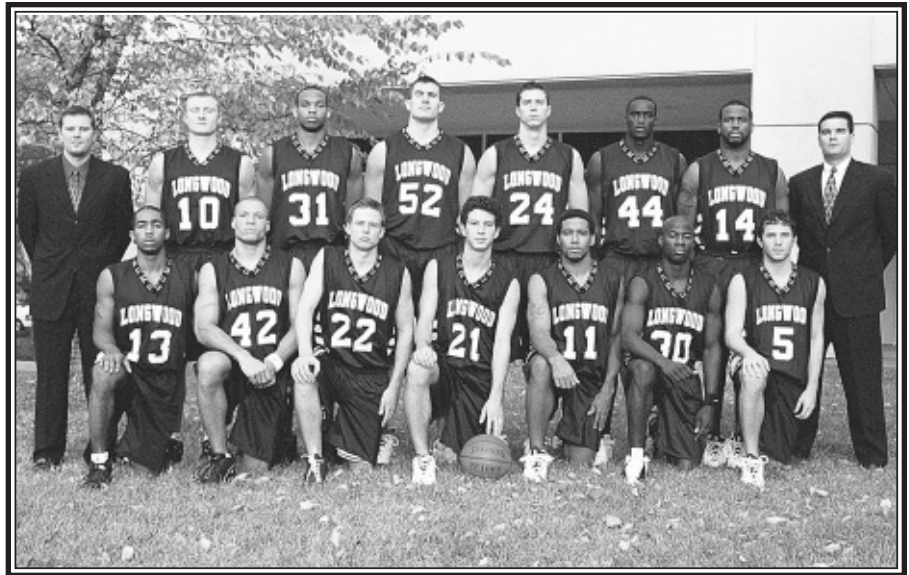
Longwood accomplished the best one-season turnaround in Division II men's basketball at a +19-game about-face. The Lancers finished 23-8 after a 4-22 season the year before (1999-2000), equaling the most wins in the program's 22-year Division II history (23), and equaling the second-most wins in the program's history. Longwood also claimed its first-ever Carolinas-Virginia Athletic Conference (CVAC) Tournament Championship.

Longwood shattered the school's record-book during 2001-02 with 41 new school-records. The Lancers attained 15 new team season records, 11 new individual season records, four new team single-games records, five new individual single-game records, and six new individual Lancer Hall records.

Longwood, ranked #21 in the final NABC/*Division II Bulletin* Top 25, opened the campaign with seven-straight wins, including a convincing 94-65 victory past Charleston (W.Va.) -- seeded #2 for the East Regional and ranked #18 nationally in the final poll at 23-6. The 7-0 beginning was the finest start to a season since 1979, and opening 11-2 overall was the best Division II start in the program's history.

The Lancers went 9-7 from Jan. 8 to Feb. 15, dropping five games by six points or less, including three games by three points or less. Four of the team's eight overall losses were to nationally-ranked opponents, and six of the eight losses overall were by six points or less. Longwood responded well by winning seven of its last eight games, and 12 of its final 16 contests overall, including the CVAC Tournament Championship to earn just the third Division II Tournament appearance in school history.

Leading the one-season turnaround were Colin Ducharme and Jason Pryor, each DAKTRONICS All-Americans. Ducharme, a consensus first-team All-American and the NABC, DAKTRONICS, and *Division II Bulletin* National Player of the Year, posted a double-double average of 19.6 points and a national-best 15.8 rebounds, shooting 60% from the field and 79% at the line. He added a new school-record for season blocks with 130 (4.2) and also had 100 assists (3.2). Among his 10 new school-records, Ducharme also posted 29 double-doubles and 31-straight double-figure scoring games.

Pryor led Longwood with his 24.8 points, shooting 49% from the field and 84% at the free throw line. He added 4.8 rebounds, 2.7 assists, 63 three-pointers, and a team-best 54 steals (1.8). Pryor scored a new school-record 745 points that season, and posted 30 consecutive double-figure scoring games en route to establishing six new school-records, including a Lancer Hall-record 41 points against Barton (N.C.).

Marques Cunningham added 11.9 points, with a team-best 4.1 assists per game. Chris Isaacs and Zech Boyd, along with Jay Louden - each averaged 4.2 points, while other scoring averages included Isaac Lartey (3.2), Russell Thompson (2.9), B.J. Buford (2.6), along with Marek Zielinski (1.3) and walk-on Matt Donohue (0.4).

The Lancers averaged 88.0 points, shooting 49% from the field as a team, a school-record 38% on three-pointers, and 74% at the line. Longwood limited opponents to 76.0 points and 40% shooting from the field, including just 32% on treys.

## #54 Jerome Kersey • Retired Jersey

Jerome Kersey (6-7) played 17 seasons (1984-2001) in the National Basketball Association (NBA) for six different teams, winning an NBA Championship with San Antonio (1999). Prior to his NBA career, he was a four-year starter and two-time National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) Division II All-American (1984, 1st-Team; 1983, 3rd-Team) at Longwood (1980-84). A 1984 NBA Draft Second-Round selection (46th overall) of Portland, Kersey was also the 1984 Virginia College Division Player of the Year. He was one of six initial inductees into the inaugural Longwood University Athletics Hall of Fame on November 27, 2005.

A native of Clarksville, Kersey led Longwood to a record of 64-39 during his career. As a senior, he averaged 19.6 points and a national Division II-best 14.2 rebounds en route to his 1st-Team All-America and State Player of the Year honors. Kersey received an invitation to the 1984 Portsmouth Invitational Tournament (PIT) NBA pre-draft camp, and earned PIT All-Tournament Team honors. He still holds 10 Longwood school-records, including career rebounds (1,162), and scored 1,756 career points for the Lancers to (currently) rank second all-time. Kersey earned numerous additional honors while at Longwood, including All-Region (1982-84), All-State (1983-84), and All-Conference/Player of the Year (1984).

Kersey played 11 NBA seasons in Portland (1984-95), becoming only the second player in franchise history to score 10,000-plus career points (10,067), and grab 5,000-plus career rebounds (5,078) while helping the Trail Blazers to 10 NBA Playoff appearances, including two trips to the NBA Finals (1990, 1992). His best season statistically was 1987-88 when he averaged 19.2 points, 8.3 rebounds, 3.1 assists, and 1.6 steals. Kersey also played pro-

He currently resides in Happy Valley, Oregon where he presently serves as Director of Project Development for California-based Kuri Productions, Inc..

## #52 Colin Ducharme • Retired Jersey

Colin Ducharme (6-9) was named the 2001 Verizon/NABC NCAA Division II National Player of the Year. The consensus 1st-team All-American was chosen player of the year by select Division II member coaches of the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC). Ducharme was honored in Minneapolis, Minnesota during the Division I Final Four where he received his award April 1, 2001.

Ducharme had previously been named the DAKTRONICS/CoSIDA and *Division II Bulletin* magazine National Player of the Year, and was a 1st-Team All-American by the NABC, DAKTRONICS/CoSIDA, *Division II Bulletin*, and *Basketball Times* magazines.

Ducharme was also named the 2000-01 CVAC Male Athlete of the Year as voted by the conference athletic directors. This prestigious award is presented annually in recognition of outstanding athletic contributions and achievements. He was also named the Longwood Male Athlete of the Year for 2000-01.

Ducharme posted a double-double average of 19.6 points and a national-best 15.8 rebounds during 2000-01, adding 4.2 blocks (2nd nationally) and 3.2 assists while shooting 60% from the field and 79% at the free throw line. He led the Lancers to a 23-8 record, the school's first CVAC Tournament Championship, and into the East Regional semifinals while establishing 11 new school-records.

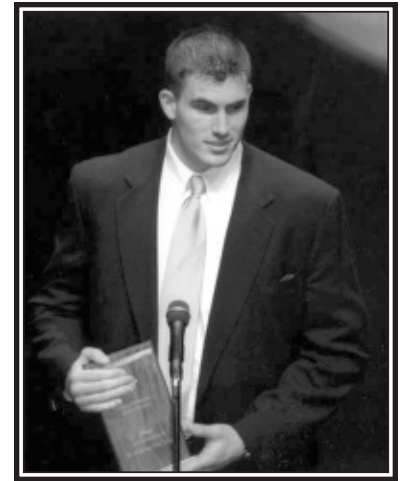
Ducharme was named one of the Top 10 players in the 2001 Blu Summer League, a premier European showcase event for professional and aspiring professional players. He was also named the BSL's Best Rebounder among the 96 players participating in Treviso, Italy. Ducharme played four games in Italy and averaged his usual double-double of 12.8 points (51) and 13.0 rebounds (52), including single-game highs of 19 points and 18 rebounds in separate contests. After a slow start in game one (11 rebounds, four points), he bounced back to average 15.7 points and 13.7 rebounds during his final three games.

Ducharme has the only two triple-doubles in Longwood history: 20 points, 21 rebounds, and 11 blocked shots at Belmont Abbey; and 24 points, 18 rebounds, and 10 assists vs. West Chester in the regionals. His 2000-01 season and career-bests included 33 points, 22 rebounds (three times), 11 blocked shots, and 10 assists.

Ducharme was also the only Division II

Ducharme played in the French Pro B League during 2003-04 with Evreux, averaging 14.2 points and 9.7 rebounds in 27 games. He played in the French Pro A League during 2002-03 with Paris Basket Racing, averaging 11.7 points and 6.5 rebounds in 10 games. Ducharme had played for Antibes of the same league at the end of the 2001-02 season, averaging 16.9 points and 10.9 rebounds in the final 14 games. He had begun his European career with Avellino of the Italian A-1 League at the start of 2001-02, seeing limited time in just five games (3.4 points, 2.0 rebounds) before suffering a knee injury that required subsequent surgery and rehabilitation.

The #52 jersey of Colin Ducharme was officially retired on December 1, 2001. Now

### WILLETT HALL

Willett Hall (formerly Lancer Hall) is home to Longwood Basketball and one of the finest athletic and physical education facilities of any similar size institution in the Commonwealth of Virginia. The facility was completed in 1980 at a cost of \$4.5 million.

Longwood University honored three former institution presidents, including Dr. Henry I. Willett Jr., on September 9, 2004 with three major buildings on campus named in their honor. Lancer Hall was named Willett Hall for the president from 1967 to 1981. Dr. Willett oversaw the transformation of Longwood into a fully coeducational institution.

Willett Hall features a 2,522-seat arena that had its floor replaced just prior to this 2004-05 season, as well as convenient concession stands located in the main lobby -- recently renovated during 2003-04, four locker rooms, training room, weight room, swimming pool, and other facilities for the University's 14-sports.

The summer of 2006 witnessed the beginning of renovations to Willett Hall for the Longwood University men's and women's basketball programs. The work completed this summer and fall prior to the new seasons included new lighting, new paint-work surrounding the floor, painting of the new Lancer Athletics logo at center-court, new team and individual banners, and renovations to the locker rooms of both programs.

The walls have been painted a combination of blue, white, and gray while the new athletics logo was painted in blue over a white background in the center-circle of the court. The old team and individual banners have been replaced with a more modern banner emphasizing the blue and white school colors. The first phase of the locker room project has resulted in an expansion in size via the demolition of some existing walls along with upgrading of the individual lockers.



The men's basketball program at Longwood has compiled a home-court record of 212-113 during 26 seasons of action in Willett Hall, an overall winning percentage of .652%. Last season (2005-06; 8-4), Longwood drew 2,418 fans to the facility for the game against James Madison, its largest crowd of the season, for an exciting 77-73 victory. It was the largest crowd at the building since the 1980's era that featured former All-American and 17-year NBA veteran Jerome Kersey. The Lancers averaged 994 over 12 home games a year ago, including three crowds over 1,500 among five over 1,000 overall. This year, Longwood will play 12 home contests with games against Division I opponents VCU, Liberty, Hampton, Navy, American, Florida Atlantic, High Point, Morgan State, Savannah State, and NJIT; along with Virginia-Wise and Shenandoah.

Longwood averaged a school-record 1,173 during the memorable 2000-01 season when the Lancers posted a 23-8 record, including 11-3 (.786%) at home. That season included a near capacity 2,213 for a contest against former Division II archrival Queens (N.C.).

## *Program Records*

Colin Ducharme only played one season at Longwood, but certainly made the most of it. Ducharme was named the 2001 NABC Division II National Player of the Year.

## About The School

With a legacy of learning dating back over 165 years, Longwood University has developed a meaningful learning environment that extends far beyond the classroom. Founded in 1839 as the Farmville Female Seminary Association, the school was a pioneer first in private and later in public education. The State of Virginia acquired the school in 1884 and renamed it as the Normal School, the first state institution of higher learning for women in Virginia. Over the years, the school expanded its curricula and had a succession of names, becoming Longwood College in 1949 and fully coeducational in 1976. On April 24, 2002, history was again made at Longwood when Governor Mark Warner signed legislation that designated Longwood as a university, effective July 1, 2002.

The legacy that began in 1839 continues today as Longwood University offers over 100 majors, minors and concentrations through its various academic programs. Given its historical roots, Longwood University enjoys an enviable reputation for teacher preparation. But the excellence has expanded throughout the university with strong programs in the liberal arts and sciences, business, professional and pre-professional programs. Today, the coeducational, comprehensive state university has an enrollment of over 4300 students and is comprised of three separate colleges: the College of Arts and Sciences, the College of Business and Economics, and the College of Education and Human Services and a graduate division offering programs in education, English, sociology, and a new MBA in Retail Management.

Under the leadership of President Patricia P. Cormier, Longwood is committed to developing citizen leaders and provides a meaningful learning environment where students learn skills, knowledge and theory and then translate learning into action by doing research, internships, field work and community service. Recognizing the value of experiential learning, Longwood is one of the few universities in the country to require all students to complete an internship or similar learning experience before graduation. Additionally, Longwood was the first institution in Virginia to require that every freshman have a laptop computer. Technology is integrated throughout the learning process-an essential element for preparing the leaders of tomorrow.

The Longwood learning environment is enriched further by the Greenwood Library that holds 245,000 book titles, 2,100 print journal subscriptions, and some 100 electronic data bases including access to 11,000 full-text electronic journals and provides integrated technology for information retrieval from libraries throughout the world, as well as satellite reception of foreign programs and web access. This state-of-the-art facility is named in honor of Longwood's 22nd president, Dr. Janet Daly Greenwood.

Longwood students continue to rate their university as one of the most engaging in the country, according to results from the National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE). In the 2002 survey, seniors rated Longwood at or above the 80th percentile on 6 of the 9 NSSE benchmarks when compared with Masters institutions; freshmen rated Longwood at or above the 60th percentile on all 9 benchmarks when compared with Masters institutions. "Student Engagement with Technology" continued to lead the way at the 90th percentile or higher. The survey was developed by national assessment experts as an alternative to the U.S. News & World Report rankings, which are strongly influenced by resources and reputation. NSSE is sponsored by The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and The Pew Forum for Undergraduate Learning.

Additionally, Longwood University is one of only 20 "high performing" institutions nationwide selected to participate in the Documenting Effective Educational Practices (DEEP) project being conducted by the National Survey of Student Engagement (NSSE) and the American Association for Higher Education (AAHE). Basically, the main purposes of the project will be to discover what practices enhance the learning process for college students and then to share that information with colleges and universities throughout the nation. Longwood was selected for the project because it was identified as an "educationally effective institution" based upon NSSE benchmark results and "promising persistence and graduation rates." In addition, the new U.S. News & World Report Best Colleges Survey ranks Longwood with the 10th highest graduation rate (61 percent) among all master's level universities in the South.

Longwood provides a range of business services to the region and state through the Longwood

Small Business Development Center, while the Longwood Center for the Visual Arts serves as an important and innovative study center and cultural resource for the Commonwealth of Virginia.

Longwood University also has a tremendous economic and cultural impact on Farmville and the surrounding communities. A recent study conducted by the Longwood Small Business Development Center estimates that university employees, students, and visitors spent over \$100 million in 2001--with 54 percent of that amount being spent in Farmville and the eight surrounding counties.

The Longwood campus, located in the heart of historic Farmville, Virginia, provides excellent facilities while reflecting the charm, beauty, and character associated with its long heritage. The campus community was enhanced recently with the opening of Brock Commons, a beautiful pedestrian promenade that provides a central focal point for the Longwood campus while eliminating traffic congestion and safety hazards. Fountains, walkways, outdoor sculpture and beautiful landscap-

ing contribute to Brock Commons, creating a park-like atmosphere for students, faculty, staff, and the public.

The University has completely recovered from the devastating fire of April 24, 2001 that destroyed several historic buildings on campus including the Ruffners, Grainger Hall, and the signature Rotunda. A completely rebuilt Grainger Hall opened in 2004 and Ruffner Hall and the Rotunda were re-dedicated on April 23, 2005. Construction is also underway for a new Health and Fitness Center that will feature a wide range of programs and amenities for students, faculty, and staff. A new science center opened in 2006 and provides the latest technology and scientific equipment for students and faculty.

One of the more popular buildings on campus is the two-story, 60,000 square foot Dorrill Dining Hall located on Brock Commons across from the Lankford Student Union. Named in honor of Dr. William Franklin Dorrill, Longwood's 23rd president, this multi-purpose facility, with its curved, colonnaded portico overlooking Iler Field, is the first on campus to utilize geothermal heating and cooling. The flexible interior design provides space for banquets, meetings, and special events along with a Grand Dining Room seating 500 and an arcade seating an additional 700.

Behind and alongside this area are broad malls, lawns, 11 tennis courts, four athletic fields, an indoor-outdoor swimming pool, and numerous late-20th century buildings, including the library, residence halls, the Lankford Student Union, and various academic facilities. The campus has six auditoriums ranging in size from 150 seats to over 1200.

Willet Hall, named in honor of Longwood's 21st president, Dr. Henry Irving Willett Jr., is a \$4.5 million health, physical education, and recreation complex. It has a gymnasium with 3,000 seats; a complete weight-training laboratory; an Olympic-size pool with a three-meter board and underwater sound, lighting, and observation window; a 500-seat natatorium; a modern dance studio with a floating floor and staging capacity; and one of the state's best-equipped laboratories for the study of human performance as it relates to exercise, sports, health, and the arts. Nearby, is a nine-hole golf course and Longwood Estate, the home of the President.

Longwood University is accredited by the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools to award bachelors and masters degrees. Other accreditation includes the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, the Virginia State Board of Education, the National Association of Schools of Theatre, and the National Association of Schools of Music. Specific program endorsements include the undergraduate Social Work Program that is accredited by the Council on Social Work Education; the undergraduate Therapeutic Recreation Program that is accredited by the National

Recreation and Park Association in cooperation with the American Association for Leisure and Recreation; and the undergraduate Business Administration Program that is accredited by Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business (AACSB- International).

Finally, for the eighth year in a row, Longwood is ranked among the top regional public schools in the South in the 2006 U.S. News & World Report "Best Colleges" Guide. The university moved up from 37th to 36th for public and private Southern universities offering master's degrees. In addition, Longwood was included in two favorable categories: Highest Graduation Rates (61 percent) and Least Debt. The percentage of graduates with debt has dropped from 84 to 77 percent, and the average debt has decreased from \$14,574 to \$14,326.



## About The Town, Commonwealth

### THE FARMVILLE AREA

Longwood University is located in historic Farmville, Virginia -- 65 miles west of Richmond, 48 miles east of Lynchburg, and 60 miles south of Charlottesville -- the Heart of Virginia. The Town of Farmville has a population of 6,500.

The Farmville Area is comprised of the town of Farmville, along with the counties of Prince Edward and Cumberland. This area serves as a retail hub and commercial activity center for eight counties of Southside Virginia and has a service market of more than 100,000 people. Education is a dominant factor in the area, with three outstanding colleges offering educational and training opportunities. In addition to Longwood University, Hampden-Sydney and Southside Virginia Community colleges are located in the area.

The Farmville Area has a diversified economy with strong manufacturing, trade, service, and agricultural sectors. Manufacturing activity centers around natural resources, textiles, and a variety of industrial and consumer goods.

The Town of Farmville is also home to the annual Heart of Virginia Festival (first Saturday in May) and many historical sites, including Appomattox Courthouse and Sailors Creek Battlefield. These points of interest make the Farmville Area a very attractive place to be. Located in and near town are churches, hotels, motels, a country club, a municipal airport, and a community hospital. Many additional points of interest are within a short distance of the Farmville area.

### COMMONWEALTH OF VIRGINIA

The Commonwealth of Virginia is one of the original 13 colonies. Named for the Virgin Queen, Elizabeth I of England, Virginia was England's first successful overseas colony and the site of the first permanent English settlement in America. West Virginia was part of Virginia until 1863.

Virginia's rich political heritage helped shape the democratic principles on which the United States was founded. Virginia played an important role in the American Revolution (1775-1783), and it entered the Union as the tenth of the original 13 states on June 25, 1788. During the American Civil War (1861-1865) the state's capital, Richmond, was also capital of the Confederacy. The state has long been nicknamed Old Dominion.

George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, James Madison, and James Monroe, all Virginians, were founding fathers of the United States and were among the first five U.S. presidents. Virginia is also the birthplace of U.S. presidents William Henry Harrison, John Tyler, Zachary Taylor, and Woodrow Wilson.

Virginia is the 35th largest state in the United States, bounded on the east by the Atlantic Ocean, on the north and east by Maryland and the District of Columbia, on the west by West Virginia and Kentucky, and on the south by Tennessee and North Carolina.

According to the 2000 national census, Virginia's population was 7,078,515, ranking it 12th among the states. Virginia Beach (425,257) is one of the most popular resort destinations on the East Coast, as well as Virginia's largest city. Richmond (197,790) is the state capital and a center of banking and insurance, and of both retail and wholesale trade. The Naval Base at Norfolk (234,403) and the Naval Shipyard at Portsmouth (100,565) employ thousands of civilians and military personnel. Hampton (146,437) is important for its aviation activities such as Langley Air Force Base and a National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA) facility. In Newport News (180,150) is a shipyard that builds naval ships, including aircraft carriers. Alexandria (128,283) is part of the Washington, D.C., metropolitan area. Lynchburg (65,269) is the site of light industries. Roanoke (94,911) is the largest

city in western Virginia.

Civilian and military employment, mostly with the federal government, is an essential part of the Virginia economy. The Pentagon, which houses the Department of Defense, is located in Virginia and is the leading federal employer in the northern part of the state. There are also important military bases in Virginia, particularly the massive complex of army, navy, and air force bases in the vicinity of Norfolk.

Average January temperatures range from less than 32°F in the west to more than 42°F in southeastern Virginia. Average July temperatures range from more than 78°F in the southeast to less than 68°F in the western mountains. Total precipitation ranges from about 35 to more than 50 inches. Snowfalls are moderate, except in the mountain regions.

Besides Virginia, three other states - Kentucky, Massachusetts and Pennsylvania - use the term common-wealth as part of their official names. The delegates to the convention in Williamsburg, when the first Constitution of Virginia was adopted on June 29, 1776, used common-wealth as the name for the new form of government. It is very likely they had in mind the Puritans' rebellion against the Crown in England more than 100 years earlier.

Pennsylvania and Massachusetts also chose to be called common-wealths after independence from Great Britain. The other 10 former colonies took the name "state," the term used in the Declaration of Independence. Kentucky was once part of Virginia. When Kentuckians joined the Union as the 15th state in 1792, it also kept the name commonwealth.

In addition to her many community and collegiate responsibilities, Dr. Cormier serves as vice-chair of the Lead Virginia Board, was appointed by the Governor to serve on the Philpott Commission and also serves on the Faculty Development Committee of the University of Virginia Medical School, and Executive Leadership in Academic Medicine Board at Drexel University. She is the past chair of the Executive Committee of the Renaissance Group, past chair of the NCAA Division II Presidents' Council, and past chair of the Council of Fellows of the American Council on Education. She served as a Commissioner on the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools' Commission on Colleges, and is the past Chair of the Board of the American Association of State Colleges and Universities (AASCU), a higher education organization whose membership is comprised of more than 430 colleges, universities, and systems of public higher education throughout the United States and its territories.

Dr. Cormier has worked with the campus community to develop and implement a new Mission, Vision, and Goals Statement for the University. This strategic plan for the future of Longwood is embodied in the first sentence of the Mission Statement: "Longwood is an institution of higher learning dedicated to the development of citizen leaders who are prepared to make positive contributions to the common good of society."

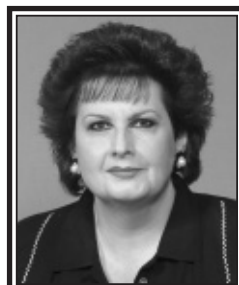

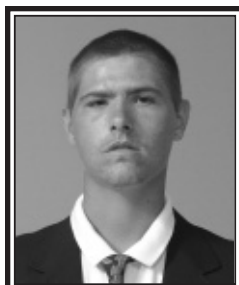

## NCAA Division I Reclassification Timeline

Longwood University President Dr. Patricia P. Cormier informed the NCAA in a letter dated November 12, 2002 of Longwood's intention to reclassify its intercollegiate athletic program to Division I status. By doing so, the institution began an NCAA-mandated five-year process, including a one-year 'exploratory period' (2002-03), to change its membership from Division II to Division I. The decision to move to Division I is part of Longwood's overall strategic plan to raise the visibility and profile of the University.

According to President Cormier, "We believe that Division I status will enhance both our institutional image and our recruitment efforts. And we think our student-athletes deserve to play at that level. We look forward to developing some great rivalries."

**MEN'S GOLF, WOMEN'S LACROSSE DIVISION I-ELIGIBLE THIS YEAR (2006-07) VIA MULTIDIVISIONAL RECLASSIFICATION**

The NCAA Membership Subcommittee accepted the Longwood Men's Golf and Women's Lacrosse programs into the **Multidivisional Reclassification** process which has led these two sports to official Division I certification as of September 1, 2006.

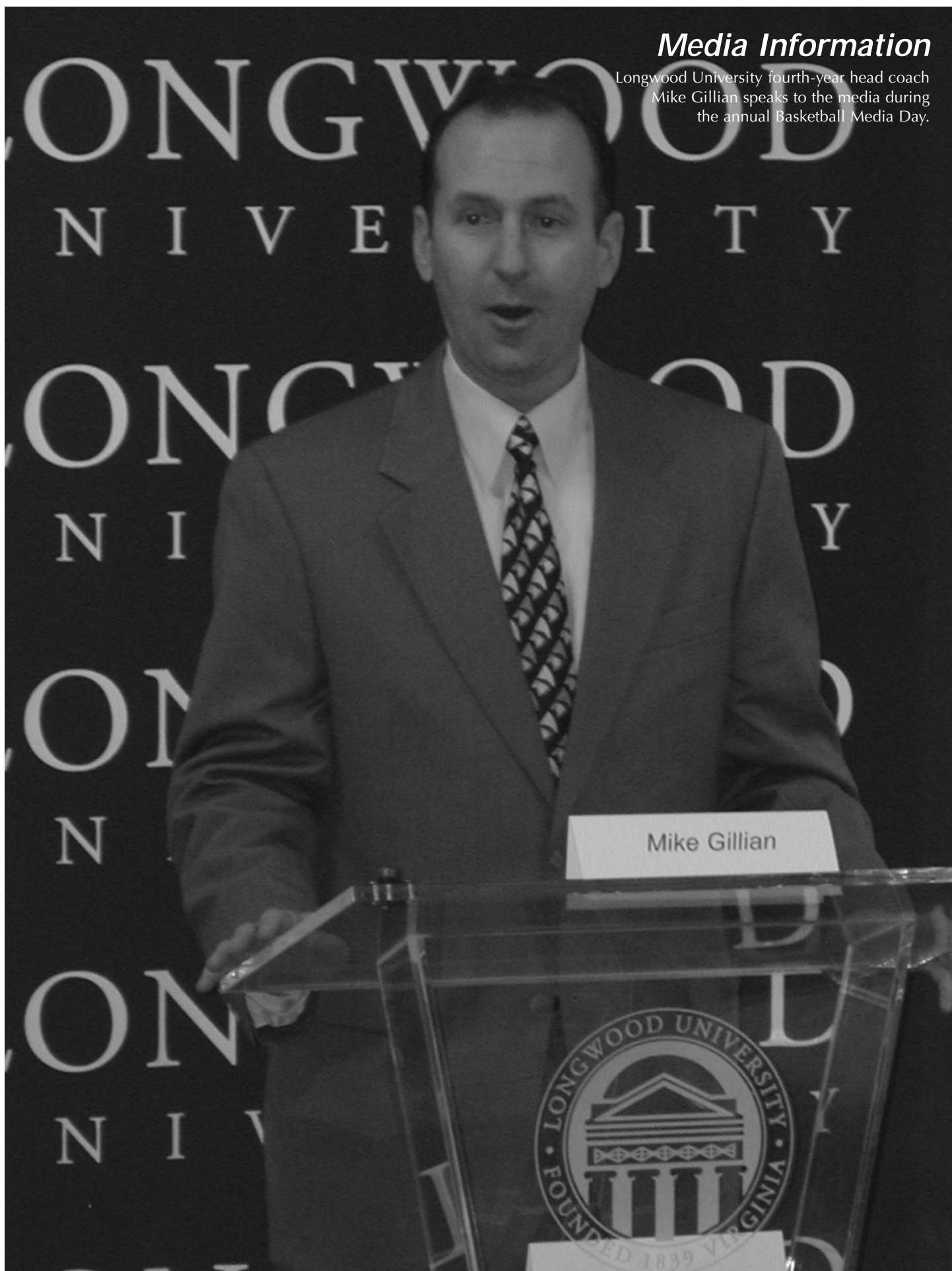
"Selecting sports for this process was not easy," explained Director of Athletics **Rick Mazzuto**. "There are clearly a number of programs that will have the opportunity to compete for an NCAA bid as soon as they become eligible. In the final analysis, we picked two sports that have already proven themselves competitive against Division I competition. I have no doubt that both will be on the board for post-season selection."

This multidivisional reclassification process is an option available only for those institutions that are reclassifying to Division I. An institution could designate one men's sport, and one women's sport, for the one-year early certification, though not an option for men's and women's basketball.

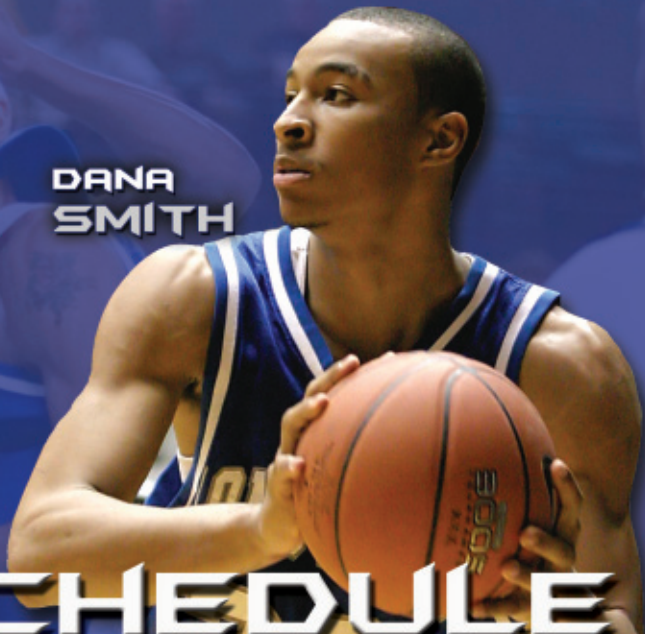

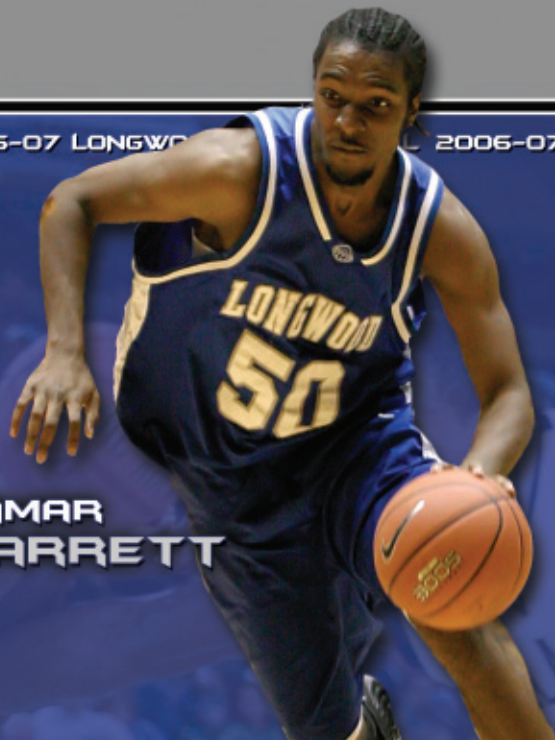
